-> forgetting the sites

Economic activities

- > destruction of site



Sacred places and heritage protection

Occasional approach

Some protected as archaeological objects

Some protected as nature monuments

Many – not protected at all

Determining the object and aims of the program

Estimating the suggested amount of work

Preparing the text of the document

Main target: heritage protection (not research)



Estimation of situation in tested areas (ca 10% of Estonia's territory)

	Total number of sacred natural places	Preserved/ protected	Destroyed	Status unknown
West Estonia (3 parishes)	100	44/41	10	46 (46%)
South-east Estonia (4 parishes + Setomaa)	101	28/13	27	46 (45%)
Central Estonia (4 parishes)	49	8/6	5	36 (73%)
Total	250	80/60	42	128 (51%)

Supposed field work results

In tested areas: 129 sites of unknown status

For all Estonia: ca. 1300 sites of unknown status Presumably:

1/3 perished,

1/3 preserved, possible to find

1/3 impossible to find

Main expected output:

ca. 400-500 sacred natural places will become identified and state protected

Presently protected as archaeologial monuments

Places / groves 107

• Springs 110

• Trees 30

Total: 446



State protection

Presently protected by the state:

446 (archaeological)+ ca. 100 single objects (nature)

Total: ca. 550 sites

 Estimated former total number of sacred natural sites: 2500–3000



Estimated amount of work

2500-3000 sites to be visited by field works

-> field works for 10 years inventory of ca. 10 parishes per year

- + making a database of sites
- + organizing state protection for preserved and discovered sites (ca. 400-500 objects)

State Conservation Plan: Historical Sacred Natural Sites

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OBJECT OF THE CONSERVATION PLAN WHAT IS SACRED NATURAL SITE?

- Sites of natural appearance
- Folkloric, archaeological, historical, ethnological etc. data referring to offering, sacredness, healing, praying, religious or ritual activities
- Areas and sites actively used since before the 20th century



Source material for identification

- Folkloric and ethnological archive data + publications
- Oral tradition
- Toponyms (NB! hiis)
- Archaeological finds and findings
- Historical records
- Historical maps
- Living practices

Levels of involvement:

1. Full inventory (dull description of sites)

- stones, trees, groves,
- water bodies (springs, rivers, lakes), elements of landscape (hills, caves, cliffs, denudations),
- stone heaps,
- enclosed areas for offering,
- sites with forced need for gift-giving,
- archaeological cemeteries related to tradition of sacredness and offering,
- sites of Catholic chapels
- "cross-trees" bound with funerary rites
- "lautsipuu-trees" bound with funerary rites
- nature objects bound to other ritual and magic activities

Levels of involvement

2.Partly inventory (location data + collecting oral tradition)

- Archaeological cemeteries/graves, church and chapel sites not bound with tradition of sacredness and offering
- Central Midsummer assembly sites
- Single stone crosses in the landscape
- Places bound with misleading and visions
- Cup-marked stones

Sites not involved

Architecture: churhes, chapels

 Churchyards, modern cemeteries and other Modern Times' burial sites

Responsible institution

The University of Tartu

State budget means

Treaty of co-operation between the National Heritage Board and the University of Tartu

Institutional overhead: 10% ->12%

Practical organization

- Steering Committee for the program
 - Headed by the Head of the National Heritage
 Board
- Ministeries of Culture, Education and Science,
 Internal Affairs, Environment, Agriculture
- House of the Native Religions

- Making and expert council for SNP at National Hertiage Board
- Institutional changes within the NHB: a special Head Inspector for SNP
- Expanding the state protection
- Composing individual protection orders for single sites
- Making a network of trusted persons

AIM 3 WEB-BASED DATABASE OF SNS: FOR PLANNING INSTITUTIONS AND HERITAGE PROTECTION AUTHORITIES
